FROM REV ROB BLACKHALL – SUPERINTENDENT MINISTER

Dear Friends

I feel privileged, following the circuit meeting, to be staying in the Torrige Methodist Circuit, as Superintendent, for the next few years. Indeed, I shall now, if it all proceeds as we understand, to complete my ministry here. We live in a wonderful part of God’s world; but more importantly there are some wonderful people and some terrific opportunities for Ministry and Mission. There are some great Christian disciples in this circuit – faithful and good people. There are lots of good things happening, or at least there were before Covid. We often think that we should be doing more, and perhaps we should; but first let us rejoice in what we are doing. In the same way we might life more people to join us; but let us thank God for those we have, and cherish each other.

Four years ago, I made various promises and you also agreed to work with me. Let us do that even more so.

As Superintendent I was asked:

Robert, to you is committed the responsibility for the life and work of this Circuit. Will you, with your colleagues, lay and ordained, care for its people, inspire its witness and watch over its life in the name of Christ?

To which I replied, I will, and I ask God to help me

In God's strength and in God's grace together we are the Church in North Devon, or at least part of it.

That is not to say that there aren't challenges, and not just because we are coming out of the pandemic. What has happened is that Covid has accelerated and accentuated many of the decisions that we were going to have to make anyway. There are choices to make about our Governance, and I suspect our property. We have a choice – Are we about Ministry and Mission, or something else?

We need to make that choice wisely. Are we going to die slowly, or give things a go?

So, what might be the priorities in the next few years?

1. Lay Leadership

The likelihood is that when Andrew and I complete our time here that this circuit will move to be a single Minister Circuit. I have always believed that the ministry of the Church is about the whole people of God. I believe that we need to realise people to exercise their ministries and gifts among us.

It also raises the question, about what you want your Ministers to do? That is a question for now; but increasingly as we move forward. Last year we had three ministers serving in this circuit. Going forward it will be one. Obviously, things will have to change.

We are delighted that we now have a Lay Pastoral Assistant and we continue to thank God for Frank's work among us. There will be other appointments too.

There will be questions about how we manage our resources, our buildings and our finances.

2. Mission

Mission has to be the priority. What are we here for? Does it make a difference to our communities if we are here or not? We as the people of God have the Good News of Jesus Christ to share by our words and our actions.

3. Justice

There is the whole environmental agenda to consider. Do we use green energy? Are we as Christian people using God's gifts well, or are we continuing to harm the environment?

There are many other questions to consider. We became aware as we shared together through the Marriage and Relationships debate that there were many other things that we might not agree on. Are we brave enough to think about Abortion and Euthanasia? What about the area in which we live? What is going to happen in our rural economy? How might government policy affect us? And what affect does that have on our Chapels?

That is a big agenda, but an exciting one. I am looking forward to working with you, as we alongside our loving God, find the way to go as we continue our pilgrimage.

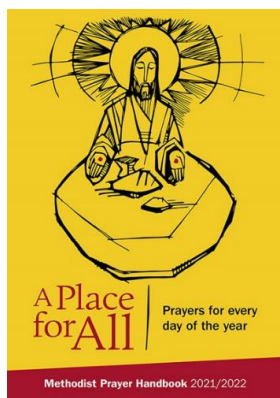

OVERSIGHT AND TRUSTEESHIP

You will be aware that there has been some discussion about the trusteeship in the Methodist Church for a while. For the circuits that has partly centred on the minimum size of a Church. The number settled on was 12. Clearly this has an impact of the Torrridge Methodist Circuit, where only 4 of our Chapels officially have membership over 12.

I am concerned for our work and our presence across the area of the Torrridge Circuit. For example, if we do nothing, I can see a situation emerging, quite soon, where our work disappears from the area south of Torrington. There are also significant issues about our ongoing work in Bideford.

The recent Conference has reworded **SO 605A Cessation and Merger** (1) *When, in any Local Church, the number of locally resident persons who are members or actively committed to its life as ministers not in the active work falls below twelve, and so continues for four successive quarters, that Church shall cease to be entitled to be recognised as a Local Church and the Circuit Meeting shall at its next meeting close it and transfer any remaining members to another designated Local Church in that or (by agreement with the Other Circuit Meeting) another Circuit.*

The aim is

- Help us to coordinate our Mission and service.
- Find Governance arrangements for any group of Christian disciples in a way that is appropriate to them
- Enable a Methodist emphasis on connexionalism to take place. To find creative ways to work together.

Last year, we shared with you a paper entitled "Reaffirming Our Calling: Oversight and Trusteeship. Torrridge Circuit – towards a way forward". You will recall that had 5 Church Councils across the circuit.

This fits with the Conference report which suggested two models for working together going forward. First, a cluster model where a membership of less than 12 becomes a class of a larger Church. Secondly, a hub or sectional scheme where a group of Chapels would come together to form a Church Council. Both are suggested in that previous paper.

However, we have gone through more months of the affects of the pandemic. I really wonder if we need an even more radical approach, as the previous model leaves us with considerable issues of management of property and finance. I will happily share a more radical approach with the Circuit. I realise none of this is easy; that some hard choices are going to have to be made. We will seek to walk with each other, every step of the way. Clearly this is going to have to be shared at Church Councils this autumn as the clock is ticking towards a new way of working coming in twelve months.

We need to consult together, perhaps first involving the Chapels south of Torrington; then as a whole Circuit.

WHAT DO YOU THINK IS THE WAY FORWARD?

While this is going to be a challenging time, I hope it will also be a blessing to us as we seek to discover how best to serve Christ in the present age.

FROM REVD ANDREW VIDAMOUR

Dear Friends,

Two similar experiences from my recent sabbatical remain vividly in my memory, both from time spent sitting in rose gardens. The first was in Saumarez Park in Guernsey on a very warm, still July afternoon with the roses in full bloom. The second was in the gardens of Reed Hall at the University of Exeter on a quiet, fine August evening, when the roses were beginning to droop and fade, with some petals already on the ground. Both were times of great peace and joy in the midst of all the changes and chances of life, not least the current pandemic, though they also caused me to contemplate the passing of time.

T.S. Eliot begins his poem 'Burnt Norton', the first in his 'Four Quartets' sequence, with a similar powerful vision of harmony in a rose garden which is also a symbol of human love and a pointer towards the eternal love of God. And at the end of Eliot's 'Four Quartets' series, at the close of the poem 'Little Gidding', he speaks of the 'fire' of the Holy Spirit and the 'rose' of human love becoming one.

How much humanity needs this vision now, as we always have done, in all the uncertainties and challenges in our experience. The Bible includes many such moments of insight and illumination: Moses at the burning bush and Jesus on the Mount of Transfiguration are but two of these.

As we continue to adapt to new realities in the Church and in life generally, especially at this time, we may want to recall and reflect on such points of revelation in the Bible and in our own journeys, as reassurance and inspiration.

For, despite all the difficulties and sufferings T.S. Eliot explores in 'Four Quartets', at the end of his poem he includes the words of Julian of Norwich: '...all shall be well and all manner of things shall be well...' as a sign of God's eternal grace.

FROM FRANK WATSON – LAY PASTORAL ASSISTANT

As part of my local preachers training I have been looking into 'calling'. The sense of it, what it means to each of us, how we are called, what we are called to. To name but a few different ideas.

Each year at the annual Local Preachers Remembering Our Call Service, in which local preachers take part in an Act of Recollection (reaffirming the promises they made at their accreditation services), there is also an opportunity for someone to share testimony. This year I had the privilege of this, and as I said to the Local Preachers at this service (just a few weeks ago) I would say these words are straight from the heart and exactly what came out as I sat down to write the short testimony.

As not all Local Preachers could be present and also in the hope that everyone who reads this will gain something from it. I share it with you as my thoughts this month.

My Sense of Call

As most of you will know, I felt from a very young age that God was calling me to be a preacher of his Good News and saving love. But as I got older, I learnt that, as it says Ecclesiastes 3, for everything there is a season, and God has made everything suitable for its time.

I am still in training, not just as a local preacher but as a disciple of Jesus Christ our Lord. As a Christian I am called by God to trust and follow Christ Jesus, to keep company with him; to learn from his words and actions; and to share in his mission.

Over these years since being given a note to preach, I have had to trust in God and trust he has a plan for me. Of course sometimes I wish he would let me know the plan he has in store but of course that often does not happen. I have to trust.

Some people probably think that because I have been on this road for a long time now and progression through my local preacher studies has been slow, sometimes stationary, I obviously don't have that strong of a calling.

Well I would argue with that. One of my go to verses in the bible for guidance and strength is Isaiah 6:8 'Then I heard the voice of the Lord saying, "Whom shall I send, and who will go for us?" And I said, "Here am I; send me!"'

A calling does not just have to be to preaching or ministry. Every time we are asked to renew our promises as accredited and trainee local preachers, I still feel able to answer, as I still feel God is calling me. However, over the years he has also called me to other places and vocations. I feel that I am a better disciple of Jesus Christ and a better preacher of his word because of the places he has called me to go to.

Have I questioned this calling and others, you bet I have... haven't we all! Have I questioned some of God's plan for me, you bet I have. Why would he allow me to get so stressed and tried to the point that I break down in tears in my work place and not return. Well at the time I thought that, but now I know, we are called to learn. As Mark writes "If any want to become my followers, let them deny themselves and take up their cross and follow me.". By taking up my cross, by going to a low place, I have learnt. I can now relate to a whole section of God's people whom before I could not relate to. How can help and support if you have not been there yourself.

Until I hit that point in my life, I had not completely surrender to my life to God. But after that, that is what I did. I trusted in him. I left that job, the career that I thought I would serve my Lord in for a long time. Not knowing where I would end up next, if I would even find another job. Who in there right mind would voluntarily quit their job in the middle of a global pandemic! I did, because after speaking to others and praying to my Lord. I surrendered or and trusted in him, and we know where he placed me. So now I trust that he will continue to call me and support me through these studies.

Master, speak: and make me ready, when thy voice is truly heard, with obedience glad and steady still to follow every word. I am listening, Lord for thee; Master, speak! O speak to me!

Address:

All our Bible passages today highlight the importance and value of human beings in the sight of God. Earlier in Genesis, we find that 'God created humankind in his image' (Genesis 1: 27), both male and female, and here we see God affirming people by offering companionship and care in human relationships.

This is a high view of human life and its potential for goodness and grace: Psalm 8, too, refers to human beings as being 'a little lower than God, and crowned...with honour and glory'. God has been aware from the start of the possibility of things going wrong for people, as we see in Genesis 3, and yet this is a marring of the good and the true, not a total disaster.

And very significantly, in our development as human beings and in our relating with each other, we are called to see each other as God sees us: despite our frailties, each of us has aspects of God's love and wisdom in our hearts and minds, sometimes more discernible than others, perhaps, but always there.

This is a radically hopeful view of how our life and society and culture are and could be, and Jesus makes it still more radical as he underlines our equality before and in God's love: men, women and children are all of equal standing.

Children, for example, have been and still are sadly undervalued and overlooked. The horrors of child labour and exploitation in Victorian England were clearly and movingly documented by Charles Dickens (e.g. in 'Oliver Twist'), and such realities still remain a blight on communities and countries around the world. Formal education for all in this country and others is still relatively recent (the early Sunday Schools played a formative part in this process from the 1770s), and still levels of educational opportunity differ across society. And socially children were often, in our culture, seen as 'little adults', and not given the freedom of self-expression they might have had. The thoughts, feelings and experiences of children have been and still sometimes may be ignored, for example in bereavement.

But Jesus, remarkably, so long ago took a far different view, making clear that we may see in children creative ways of perceiving and responding to God's love: 'whoever does not receive the kingdom of God as a little child will never enter it', Jesus said (Mark 10: 15).

Think, for example, of a child's capacity for wonder, often responding to what may seem unlikely things such as blowing bubbles or seeing small creatures.

Think of a child's capacity for trust, affection and kindness.

Think of a child's capacity for enthusiasm, loyalty and commitment.

And think of a child's sometimes apparently insatiable curiosity: all those 'Why' questions!

It is all too easy to exaggerate or over-sentimentalise these and other attributes of children, and to overlook their capacity for wilfulness, cruelty and wrongdoing, for example. Sadly, too, qualities such as wonder, affection and trust in children may all too easily be broken by other people and by circumstances in all sorts of ways.

But the point Jesus makes still holds: to notice and enter the kingdom of God, we may be helped and guided by a child-like humility – part of our sharing in the image of God. **Amen.**

Something to think about

'Jesus said: The Spirit of the Lord is upon me, because he has anointed me to bring good news to the poor. (Luke 4:18)

It's all too easy to become overwhelmed when we start to think about people who are homeless. We may think that there is little we can do about such a massive problem but the Church Homeless Trust has this advice for those who do want to help.

Currently all the news seems to be bad. The number of people without homes in England, and across the world, is increasing. The willingness and ability to help these people is decreasing. What good news do we have for the homeless poor in our towns and cities today? Providing effective help for homeless people is very difficult. There are no easy answers. There are complex social and structural issues which cause and exacerbate homelessness. And at an individual level, many people who are homeless have suffered trauma and need professional support with mental health issues or addiction. Continuing Christ's ministry is a hard and never-ending task. However, we should not underestimate the difference that we can make. Many homeless people are sustained by food banks, drop-in centres and night shelters run by church communities. Isaiah puts it quite simply: Share your food with the hungry, and provide the poor wanderer with shelter, when you

see the naked clothe them. (Isaiah 58:7) Church Homeless Trust provides a free guide called 'How to Help Homeless People', which is available to download at churchhomelesstrust.org.uk or can be ordered in hard copy by contacting us on 020 7269 1630. We suggest that church groups take time to look through the guide and plan how they can help in a realistic and safe way. Likewise, individuals and groups that do not have the resources and capacity to take practical action, should not underestimate the value of prayer, advocacy and a kind gesture.

We may feel that what we have to offer is so very little that we are powerless to help. We often say things like 'It's just a drop in the ocean, it won't make much difference' but as the poem mentioned on the video by Rev Naomi says, the ocean is made up of drops, without the drops, there would not be an ocean. Our little bit matters. So do what you can, look at the resources, talk about the subject and pray for those supporting the work on behalf of the homeless as well as the homeless themselves.

Sermon

Even if we could, none of us could fill it!

What were they thinking? How could they ask such a question? Had they not listen to Jesus at all?

These are just some of the questions going around in my head when I read our Gospel passage for today. Of course one of the first things we see wrong here is that James and John have got the complete wrong end of the stick, they are barking up the wrong tree. Thinking Jesus will have an earthly kingdom one day and forgetting that he will have a heavenly one instead. And at this point what do the other disciples do, well they start to get angry with James and John, and why do this? Why not try and help Jesus explain why they cannot sit next to him on the throne. Well this is because they did not understand themselves.

So the question is why can't anyone sit next to Jesus on the throne? Well let's look at the passage from Hebrews, and the first place to look is not beginning at our passage but a few verses back. Verses fourteen to sixteen of chapter four which is the start of a section entitled Jesus the Great High Priest, where we found our passage for today later on in the chapter. Let me just read you verses fourteen to sixteen because this will help us understand about Jesus being on the throne. And how it links to our Gospel reading.

Hebrews 4:14-16

"Since, then, we have a great high priest who has passed through the heavens, Jesus, the Son of God, let us hold fast to our confession. For we do not have a high priest who is unable to sympathize with our weaknesses, but we have one who in every respect has been tested as we are, yet without sin. Let us therefore approach the throne of grace with boldness, so that we may receive mercy and find grace to help in time of need."

This whole passage speaks of Jesus's death on the cross. The passage says that no one can take the honour of being a high priest unless God has called them to it. And that is what he did. He sent his only Son to be born into a normal earthly family, to then go on to live an earthly life only to die a painful death which he know was always going to happen. And why did he have to die well it was not for him o no it was so that we could be saved from our sinful ways. He died with our sin on his shoulders. Just imagine knowing you were going to die for that. Would you do it?

Taking you back to James and John and the other disciples for a minute, as Jesus know none of them really understood why James and John could not sit next to Jesus on the throne, Jesus like he always did sat them down, and explained it to them. So when they began to understand what he was telling them about how he has to die to save the world from sin. How did they both feel? This meditation which am going to share with you is from the view of both of the brothers. Listen to this.

We did know what we were asking,
or at least we thought we did.

We wanted a share of the spoils,
to be identified with Jesus,
when he came into his kingdom,
as his right-hand men,
his loyal followers,
sharing in the limelight,
basking in his glory,
only that's not what his glory meant.
We hadn't fathomed it at all,
both of us still thinking in terms of human values,
the approbation of this world.
And we couldn't have been more wrong,
for the crown he would wear was one of thorns,
his lifting up to be on a cross
and his victory to be won through death.
Would we have asked to share that glory had we known what it involved?
Would we have taken the way of service and sacrifice,
of costly commitment?
I don't think so,
for though we'd followed Jesus for years,
we'd still barely grasped what he'd come to do.
I tell you what though,
we grasped it later,
for we saw him suffer,
watched him die,
his life freely offered as a ransom for many.
He's enthroned now, of course,
but his kingdom is in heaven, not on earth,
and he, the King of kings and Lord of lords,
rules there as servant,
the one who surrendered all to make us his.
It's my turn now to take up my cross,
and for me that's not just a figure of speech;
it's meant literally,
for I too now must give everything.
I asked for glory,
and I've got it,
though not of this world.
It's been an honour, Lord, to serve.

Jesus the son of man who came not to be served but to serve and then give his life as a ransom for many was given his throne by his father God, and that is what he had to do for it.

So let us go back to my opening line, even if we could, none of us could fill it, and that is true. No one in this world would give up their life freely to save the rest of the world. No one is sin free like Jesus. He died to save us from our sins. We all still sin, we all still ask for God's forgiveness every day.

We cannot be like him but we can try to get closer to him. By praying more to him, trying to understand his word more by reading our bibles more. Being a good neighbour by watching out for each other. And the most important thing taking up our cross every day and showing everyone that we love our Lord Jesus and will do everything for him.

Let us pray.

Lord Jesus Christ, we try to see beyond this world, but we struggle to do so, for the here and now is what we know best, the context in which we play out our daily lives. Though we strive to do otherwise, automatically we assess things from a human point of view, from what popular opinion counts as success.

Help us instead to grasp the values of your kingdom, in which defeat is victory, the last are first, the weak are strong, and death brings life – to recognise that glory, as you understand it, is not about lording it over others but about selfless service, about giving rather than receiving, a cross instead of a crown. If we would share you glory, teach us first what it truly means.

The story of Bartimaeus is about vision in more ways than one. Bartimaeus not only wants his physical sight, but he knows where to go for help and who to ask for it: Jesus commends him for his faith (though significantly it must be remembered that faith does not guarantee physical or other cure from ills and illnesses).

Insight does not depend on having physical sight: John Milton produced the epic poem 'Paradise Lost' when he was blind, and we may reflect too on similar feats such as Beethoven creating musical masterpieces when he was deaf. More recently, too, in the twentieth-century Helen Keller achieved much while being blind and deaf.

Perhaps all this is reflected in the several meanings we attach to the word 'vision'. One is clearly physical sight, and how precious that is as the story of Bartimaeus reminds us.

But we also use 'vision' in a more symbolic way, suggesting the use of the imagination and 'the mind's eye' to help bring hope and inspiration. So at Pentecost, Peter quotes from the Old Testament prophet Joel where he speaks of young people seeing visions and old people dreaming dreams (Acts 2: 17). Think too of Martin Luther King Junior's great 'I have a dream' speech back in 1963, echoing the great visions of justice and peace we find in such sources as the Jewish prophet Isaiah.

In these ways, 'seeing' is about 'what might be' as well as 'what is', affirming what is healthy and creative in the here and now but also looking for new and better ways of being human and living together in society. Les Isaacs had a vision to create the Street Pastors movement some years ago, and this has now become a reality in many places across the world, with volunteers working alongside the police and local authorities in helping to make the streets of our towns and cities safer places to be. And we have similar organisations in School Pastors and (in Bude) Beach Pastors.

Let us pause for a few moments to consider the visions we have for the world, the Church, our communities, ourselves.

(Pause)

What dreams are we being given by God as we follow Jesus, as Bartimaeus did?

(Pause)

Who are our visionaries, within the Church and beyond it?

(Pause)

That may seem to take us a good way from our starting-point, but themes of faith, courage and renewal are there in the encounter between Jesus and Bartimaeus as well.

And perhaps it is no accident that Mark places this episode just before the events of Holy Week: the inward eyes of many would soon be opened to who Jesus was and what he came to do.

How do we see Jesus? **Amen.**

Talk 1 i) God's love of Creation

ii) How we damage Creation and how that is impacting people in poverty

i) God's Love of Creation

Our readings from Psalm 104 and Mark 4 vary in many ways: their purpose, their setting, and when they were written, are all noticeably different. But they also have a lot in common.

Both passages demonstrate an intimate knowledge of creation.

The psalmist describes the beauty of creation, declaring, 'O Lord, what a variety of things you have made! In wisdom you have made them all.' The author understood how creation works. They knew where the birds nest, and where the mountain goats live, the great skill of a lion as it hunts its prey, and the vast array of creatures living in the water.

They knew creation intimately: they must have spent time observing and learning how all things fit together, and they were inspired to worship as a result! In verse 31 of the psalm, just after the part we've heard, it says God rejoices in his creation. The beauty and variety of all he's made brings God joy!

Similarly, in our New Testament passage from Mark, Jesus demonstrates his own detailed understanding of creation. He describes the issues that can hinder the growth of crops: he knows how drought can cause plants to wither, or how rocky ground prevents the development of roots. Even though he was a carpenter by trade, he knew the importance of nutritious soil for a bountiful harvest. Jesus has an intimate knowledge of the workings of creation.

This shouldn't be a surprise to us; the Bible tells us how all things were created for Jesus and by Jesus. In him, all things hold together: he's Lord of all creation. It's not a surprise that Jesus considers it important to observe the creation around us.

But Jesus shows us something else too. He teaches us that not only does he have an intimate relationship with creation, but that also we can learn about our heavenly Father through it. Whether it's through the relentlessness of weeds, the character of birds or the power of a mustard seed, time and again, Jesus points to the Father and the way he works through creation. We live in a busy world and often fail to take time to observe creation, but as the writer of Proverbs advises, 'Go to the ant... consider its ways.'

From the psalms to the gospels, we see the ways creation can reveal more of God's character and inspire us to worship, and we see how God delights and finds joy in all he's made!

ii) **How we damage Creation and how that is impacting people in poverty**

But when we look at the world today, we can see the many ways that we've damaged this beautiful gift God has given us. The ways that we live and work and consume have pushed creation to breaking point.

In Paul's letter to the church in Rome, he explains how creation is in bondage to decay, trapped in frustration and crying out for liberation.

Whether it's plastic pollution littering seas and the poorest communities, or species going extinct at record rates, or the climate crisis making droughts, floods and storms more frequent and severe, we've misused and damaged this beautiful gift of God. We're feeling some of the effects in the UK, but the impacts are hitting people in poverty the hardest.

It's hard to grasp what that really means: it's big and abstract.

So let me quickly introduce you to Orbisa.

In the service will shall show a Video but here is her story

This is her on the screen. She's a 35-year-old mother who lives in the Afar region of Ethiopia. A few years ago, Orbisa could rely on the rains: now, because of the changing climate, they are far less predictable. So she walks up to ten hours a day, every day, to find water for her family to drink. Her livelihood depends on selling livestock – but drought has killed nine of her ten cows. She's lost nearly half her goats too. Let's pause for a second... The stark reality is that Orbisa is paying the price for emissions which have mostly been generated by developed nations like ours. This is what she said to Tearfund: 'We used to get rain every four to five months; the area was very fertile and green. But it hasn't rained for six months and I don't know when it will rain next. I feel worried whenever I think about the future.'

Around the world, millions of people like Orbisa are being pushed back into poverty because of climate change. In 2016, world hunger started to increase for the first time in a decade and has

continued to increase every year since. And that's because of climate change and conflict, with climate change exacerbating the risk of conflict.

The science is clear: the climate crisis is being caused by us, especially us in developed nations, and the impacts are accelerating. We are running out of time to prevent the worst effects. We have to act fast and change the way we live, and governments have to be much more ambitious. But right now, we have a unique window of opportunity. How the government chooses to rebuild after the pandemic will shape our economy, climate and society in the decades to come. This is a crucial moment.

In the Bible Jesus tells us the most important commandments are to love God, and to love our neighbours. Tackling the climate crisis is vital to both of these – honouring God by protecting his creation and loving our global neighbours who are hit first and worst by what is now a climate emergency.

i) The Hope we have in Jesus

Colossians 1:19–20 says this:

'For God was pleased to have all his fullness dwell in him [Jesus], and through him to reconcile to himself all things, whether things on earth or things in heaven, by making peace through his blood, shed on the cross. 'To reconcile to himself all things, things on earth and things in heaven...' Our world is broken, but God is at work reconciling and restoring.'

Explanation

To me, this says I need a much bigger view of Jesus. He didn't come just to reconcile me with my Father in heaven, but to reconcile and restore ALL things – in heaven and on earth! That's far more than just us. Jesus came to begin the restoration of the world to how God intended it to be. To make all things new.

Jesus values creation, shows us how it reveals the love of the Father, and brings restoration and healing – uniting everything back with God.

We can have hope. Because of Jesus' death on the cross, all things can be made new; everything sin has broken and corrupted is being restored and reconciled to God. And what's more, we can be part of it. Jesus invites us to participate in his mission in this world.

The world is crying out, but God is at work and we're invited to join him in a ministry of reconciliation – reconciling people to their Father, but also reconciling people to the creation we've been given to steward, and seeing it restored. This is the fullness of the gospel, not a side issue.

ii) An Invitation to Respond

So how can we respond?

To answer that question, let's turn to Esther in the Old Testament. In the face of a crisis, she responds with faith and courage.

In the book of Esther, the Persian king makes plans to wipe out the Jews, but Esther's uncle, Mordecai, warns her about the plan. Esther's response to the news of the threat to her people is remarkable. She tells Mordecai to gather people together to pray and fast. While they do so, she

will approach the king and ask him to reconsider – even though she knows that it is against the law and she could lose her life.

In chapter 4 she says to Mordecai: ‘Go, gather together all the Jews who are in Susa, and fast for me. Do not eat or drink for three days, night or day. I and my attendants will fast as you do. When this is done, I will go to the king, even though it is against the law. And if I perish, I perish.’

Esther teaches us that following Jesus requires us to speak up against injustice, even when it’s costly to ourselves – and that we should act from a foundation of prayer.

So I want to invite you to commit to both of these things: to prayer and to action, so that we can address the huge injustice of climate change and its impact on the poorest people around the world, especially in the days that follow during the COP 26 Conference.
